This area is a public right-of-way and along the pedestrian trail, shade trees along 17 th will provide beauty, noise reduction to our neighborhood and improve the entire neighborhood appeal and reduce the watering required to this very large area. This project will place approximately 27 shade trees along 17 th Avenue between the street and bikeway. Everyone who drives, walks or bikes through this area will benefit from this project. It will blend in with the neighborhoods around us as they have trees along 17 th Avenue and will enhance our "Arbor City" appeal.

selecting tree varieties suggested by them.
